NEWSLETTER FOR AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER 2016



The most exciting thing worth mentioning out of all the activities in August and September is the issue of the borehole. We now have water on our new site! We have also built a pretty big roof on the first class room and the road is finished at last.

The kids are going on as usual, some of the class 4 students are really improving their english skills and we enjoyed a nice day at the beach together a while back.

Also, we have some new sponsors and followers who have asked questions about our project, so let me try to clarify a few things: The school (with our 20 kids and 3 teachers) is currently located in Mtwapa, in rented locations. This is one hours drive south from the "new site" which is located 30 min outside Kilifi town. On the new site, Lee, myself, 3 dogs, 1 cat, 4 chickens and 2 watchmen are based. So we are here at the "new site" developing the premisses for the new school and they are in Mtwapa running the school there.

Hopefully, between January and March, we will have built student and staff housing. Then, the whole school is to be shifted to the new site, meaning, the kids will come as boarding students and the teachers will live here in staff units. As the school expands, it is meant to be a normal day-school for the local community. Hope that was clear :)

HELLO YOU BEAUTIFUL BOREHOLE!

What a milestone, getting water on site! Now, some serious construction and irrigation can finally begin. We found water at 25 m depth and thought initially that is was fresher than first estimated. However, as we continued pumping, it got saltier. Now, what remains is buying a pump, tanks and digging pipelines across the site. For drinking water, we will have to connect to council water, which they have just finished laying the pipes for in our area. This project was made possible thanks Fredrik Bornø Haukeland and Martin Whatson who initiated the Eco Moyo Auction earlier this year; more than 25 artists donated pictures that were auctioned online. WE LOVE YOU!!!!





ROOFING OUR FIRST CLASSROOM

In March, we arranged a workshop to build this space from cob (mud-mix) and had volunteers helping us out. Unfortunately, Lee and I had a motorcycle accident and were forced to cancel the workshop (this is why the walls and floor are so unfinished). Now, we decided to put a roof before we continued, so as to be able to resume the work in the shade. The "fundis" (craftsmen) have worked very hard and we are very happy with the result! The roof is made of timber (Casorina) poles and palm leafs.

This project was also made possible by the Eco Moyo Auction and donations from Westerdals students.

ROAD AND GATE FINISHED

Finally, the road is done! Roughly 500m x 4m of digging out, laying, spreading and compacting coral stone dust. Check! The gate was not plastered or painted so that got fixed as well!

This is thanks to donations by Trond Husby, our new Norwegian friend who lives in Kilifi as well!!





SHADE HOUSE

Lee built this in August and now we are seeing some results of what has been planted. These are the happy varieties, others that didn't make it. Try and fail. We still need to work on the soil, adding organic matter (tried making hot compost which failed completely...!)

And, we finally found a serious company for soil testing, so thats on the agenda as well!











CHICKEN TRACTOR

- Is basically a mobile chicken house. The chicks scratch up the ground and poo all over it, adding nutrients to the ground, then move to a new section and do the same. This is great for preparing an area for growing and then you get the eggs of course!

On the same day as we got the water in the bore hole, the first egg was laid, both equal big deals :)

The kids are going on as usual, our setup there is pretty stabile, although we have our challenges from time to time. Now, for example the owner is demanding a higher rent. Our contract expired in August and unless we wanted to shift locations (again) we had to give in. In any case, this is hopefully the last time we have to deal with this as the next shift will be to our new site where there will be no rent to be paid at all, although other expenses will arise.

Then, the school van needed to go through an annual inspection that cost way more than we imagined and our driver Patrick got arrested cos the top gutter on the van was rusty (corrupt bastards) - we paid our way out, but every time these situations occur, we get so frustrated as it obviously affects the budget and feels so unfair, considering everything we do to give these kids education, oh well.

Otherwise, the oldest kids have really improved their english and its so amazing seeing their progress! The teachers are managing school expenses, delivering flawless records with receipts, etc. So happy they continue to keep up the good, thorough work!



ACTIVE CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY


